Here are some guidelines that should be followed to submit content to the DG Newsletter and The Lions Magazine.

These guidelines will make it easier for us to make sure your submission is properly processed. Failure to follow these guidelines may result in your submission being missed or directed incorrectly.

<u>Do not</u> submit multiple submissions within the same email. Please separate them as this will help us keep track of each submission.

<u>Do</u> include all content in the email. If content is too much for a single email, then please make sure to reference that there are multiple emails related to your submission (Example: You can add "Email 1 of 3" in the subject line)

The Email's subject should include:

"Club Name" <u>or</u> "Committee Name" **and** "DG Newsletter" **and/or** "Lions Magazine" submission. **Club submission**

Sample Subject: "Ajax Lions Club - DG Newsletter and Lions Magazine Submission"

Committee submission

Sample Subject: "Webmaster/IT – DG Newsletter Submission"

Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides assists Canadians with medical or physical disabilities in need of a Dog Guide by providing one at no cost. As well, Lions Clubs Camp Kirk Foundation supports the special needs of children with learning differences, attention deficit disorders,

and high functioning autism by offering a safe camping experience each summer where they will learn new skills and build confidence in a non-competitive environment.

Fellow Lions, I just wanted to share with you something that may seem not so significant if you are sighted, but if you lost all your vision as I did 5 years ago you would come to realize that many of the every day pleasures in life are not accessible anymore. I was very fortunate for several reasons, shortly after I became blind a family friend, a Lion from the North Newmarket Lions Club sponsored me and introduced me to a wonderful group of people. Not only do I have an amazing vision guide dog from the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guide School, but these great people have sponsored myself and several other blind people in our neighborhood to a week or two at the CNIB Camp Joseph at Lake Joseph. It was at this camp that I learned that you can have fun after vision loss, and you can meet people just like you. This is so, so important and I thank the North Newmarket Lions Club for their help.



Last year I met a fellow Lion from the Aurora Lions club who is also visually impaired, His name is David Burnett and we were introduced at the A-16 District Convention in Oshawa, Ontario. David mentioned that he was going golfing in a tournament for Visually impaired people and I could come and join. I mentioned to my dad and he quickly pointed out that it wouldn't be a bad idea, after all nobody would be able to tell I had never golfed before or that I was cheating. They are all visually impaired. Seemed like a perfect fit for the sport of golf. Anyways I have now been to two tournaments, I am not a good golfer, but I sure did have fun. I have included a picture of my vision guide dog Nutmeg because I think it is important that you know that the gift of a guide dog lets people like me get out in the world and have some fun. Just as a side note the owner of the first club we played in was a little worried about having the guide dogs on his course, but after the tournament he told my father and I that the dogs were better behaved than any of his other customers and they were welcome back next year. That is a testament to the great training they receive at the Lions Foundation Dog of Canada Guide School.

North Newmarket Lions Club

flying into a huge pool. Dog trainers and sports competitions. All the dogs get to swim in the town pool for \$5, signifying that this is the end of the summer program for the town's outdoor pool. Our Lions faithful BBQ team were there for two days cooking hot dogs, hamburgers, pea- meal bacon and of course the Great Canadian Burger.





New to our event this year was the North Newmarket Lions information booth. This was set up by the club to bring awareness to the Lions Foundation Dog Guide program. Lion Khrisstina Engel and Past International Director, Lion Tom Gordon, manned the booth for two days. They were accompanied by Lion Nutmeg who is a working vision guide dog sponsored by the North Newmarket Lions Club and with Teddy who attended the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guide School in Oakville. Teddy is a career change dog who now is a pet dog. Khrisstina organized this booth and was able to use her

networking skills to bring several local families with dog guides provided by the Lions, to be with us. Some of these dogs were for autism and hearing. And of course, puppies in training Elder and Figaro were a hit with the crowds. All in all, this was a good addition to our program for the Vision Pillar.

Our BBQ tent and crew followed up the following Sunday in much less desirable weather cooking up 600 hot dogs for the annual Terry Fox run. The runners made it to the finish line just as the rain came pouring down, but true to the spirit of Terry nobody complained, they ate their hot dogs happily, we put our wet tents and tools away to be dried out later, and we will be there again next year.

The hot dog wieners and buns left over uncooked were delivered to a local shelter.

Looking Forward to a good year.


